Palm Sunday Message

Palm Sunday begins the incredible final week of Jesus life and His journey toward the Cross. Jesus had been moving toward Jerusalem from Galilee. It was an exciting time; the city was ringed with tents. The population had mushroomed to three times its normal size! The crowd on that day we call Palm Sunday, certainly was not concerned about social distancing as we are today.

Enthusiasm about Jesus was growing among people who had seen the miracles, been fed, healed, and delivered from demons. Now they are ready for the final victory! The crowds are hailing Him as the long awaited Messiah. Jesus doesn't stop them. He says that if the people weren't declaring that truth, then the rocks themselves would cry out.

Matthew 21:10 (NCV) When Jesus entered Jerusalem, all the city was filled with excitement. The people asked, "Who is this man?"

Luke 19:41-42 (NCV) As Jesus came near Jerusalem, he saw the city and cried for it, ⁴² saying, "I wish you knew today what would bring you peace. But now it is hidden from you.

Jesus came into the culture of Rome and Israel in ways that were not understood by most of the people of His day. The palm branches that were spread were looking toward something that was quite different from the Kingdom that Jesus was establishing. Many wanted a restoration of the kingdom of Solomon, that was not the throne upon which Jesus would ascend.

He came to turn the world right side up. He was perceived as a threat to many religious leaders even though He came to die for the sins of all. As we reflect on where we are in this day of a worldwide epidemic, we can be an example of hope and redemption to many who are feeling vulnerable. Our Kingdom values are not the values of many in our day. At times we can be seen as a judgmental threat to some and irrelevant to others.

Do we see through God's eyes or through the distorted eyes of the world? *1 Chron.12:32* "the men of Issachar...understood the times & knew what Israel should do." The men of Issachar were part of David's army as they battled Saul. That's the way it often is; only a few understand the changing culture & know what to do. We are a part of God's army today living as ambassadors of the unseen Kingdom.

We have seen the Lord come into our lives as our Redeemer. He has changed everything! Therefore, we can spread our spiritual palm branches before Him because we know who He is and the eternal impact He has made on us now and forever.

Today no matter what we are facing as a nation and what you are confronting as an individual, our Lord is still our Lord and the one who is in control of our lives.

So, as we move toward the dark shadows of Good Friday and then the explosion of life on Resurrection Sunday, I encourage you to indeed rejoice that our Redeemer has come to deliver us from the challenges that are beyond our own ability to overcome. In all circumstances that you and I will ever face, He is the Prince of Peace.

The Holy Spirit is active in his ministry and the worship service touched me deeply - tears a couple of times! The dominant theme in the sermon was *hope* in these times of COVID-19-induced fear and isolation, preached by the rector of the church in Ballston Spa. Music by his worship leader and her two teenagers included: Cornerstone; What Wondrous Love Is This; Dem Bones, Dem Bones, Dem Dry Bones; Come Alive (Dry Bones); Blessed Be The Name of the Lord; and In Christ Alone.
