## Matthew 25:31-46 What is Eternity?

This week I want to ruminate with you about eternity. When our Gospel for this week speaks about Jesus return, this is at the end of time. Eternity at a deeper level is beyond my understanding.

Some people think of eternity as endless time. Eternity exists outside of time; Time began with creation. You and I cannot measure eternity with time because eternity supersedes time.

What was the state of affairs before that first day? We know from Genesis that there was existence before time. Remember in Genesis when it was said from heaven: ..."let us..." There was a first day; we also know that time will end. There will be a last day within time.

Eternity is a state of affairs outside of time. For me that is incredible to comprehend, because I have always been within time! It is an experience not bound by time. Eternity is before the beginning and after the end. Time actually exists within eternity.

Eternity has always existed and will never cease existing. Eternity is an age without borders. Heaven is in eternity! We pray about heaven on earth, but only glimpses of heaven on earth are possible because heaven is outside of time.

When things go well in our lives we don't want it to end. That's why we associate it with, "Heaven on Earth." When things are going badly in our lives we want them to end. It's like Hell on Earth. However, both of those expressions are interpretations from within our limited experience. When we read of Biblical revelations of heaven and of angels, there were also experiences of people within time.

When is Eternity? It isn't someday far away. Eternity is right now for the Heavenly beings. Eternity is right now for our loved ones in Jesus. They have passed out of death into life everlasting.

God is not bound by time, He exists outside of time, He created time. This is why God doesn't see things the way we see things. The Word states that "one day to God is like a thousand years."

1 day = 1,000 years or 25 Generations

- 1 week = 7,000 years or 175 Generations
- 1 year = 364,000 years or 9,100 Generations

Now I'm 75 years old. 75 times 364,000 years is a pretty large number...too big for my puny brain. That speaks of an amazing sequence of experiences, knowledge, and wisdom.

One day, because we have entrusted our future to Jesus and His work on the cross on our behalf, we will be ushered into eternity. What a promise.

Father God is eternal...The Son is eternal...The Holy Spirit is eternal. We will exist outside of time.

We are told in scripture that the current state of affairs will come to a conclusion. The Lord has bigger plans for us than this existence; we are the objects of God's love; this was His plan from the beginning. God knows where we are going and has done all for us to join him in eternity. The Lord bless you this week!

## Take-aways From Virtual Diocesan Convention, November 14, 2020

The Diocese met virtually to nominate and elect persons to Diocesan offices; to vote on proposed resolutions and changes to the Constitution and Canons of the Diocese of Ohio; and to adopt the Diocesan program and budget. Approximately 240 clergy and lay attended. Some take-aways are:

• Bishop Hollingsworth's Convention Address spoke to pandemic fears and possible future church restrictions, systemic racism, and Isaiah's charge of "Here am I, send me" being our fitting response to today's challenges

• Nominations for vacancies had few candidates beyond the minimum required; nominees willing to serve were from, predominantly, a few large congregations

• Resolutions approved were clergy compensation and changing a commission name and its mission to Commission for Racial Justice

- 2020 9-months year-to-date showed a deficit which will be zero'ed at year-end via transfers from special funds
- The 2021 budget was approved; forecasted receipts and expenses are \$3.4 Million, a 4.6% decrease over 2020
- 2021 assessments from congregations are expected to decline by 7.3% or \$163,000
- 61% of receipts or \$2.1M come from congregations, 18% from endowment and investment income, and 21% from transfers and fees

• The Diocese received \$413,000 in Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loans, likely to be 100% forgiven; 31 parishes also received PPP loans

- The Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) across the Diocese averaged 5,100 in 2019, down from 5,800 in 2015
- Of the 82 parishes over the 2014 to 2019 period, 14 saw increases in ASA, 17 were stable, and 51 congregations experienced a decline in ASA

• Advent's ASA in 2019 was 43. Of the 82 parishes, 47 had ASA larger than Advent's, 29 had smaller, and 5 about the same as Advent's

- A virtual convention is an efficient and cost-effective means of conducting Diocesan business; what is lost is person -to-person interaction
- Fr. RJ Johnson was announced as the new clergy at St. Mark's Canton
